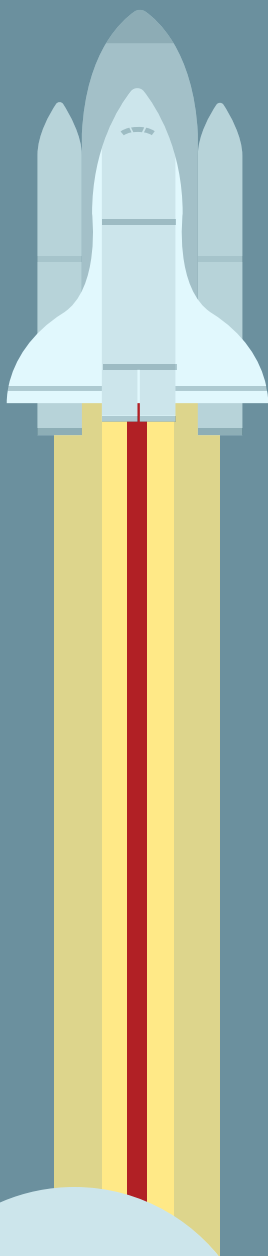

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INTRODUCTION

Work & Travel, also known as a working holiday, is a cultural exchange programme that allows young nationals from Luxembourg to discover New Zealand, Australia, Taiwan, Canada, Chile, South Korea and Japan.

This programme is developed by the Ministry of Foreign and European Affairs, Defence, Development Cooperation and Foreign Trade (MFA) through agreements with partner countries on working holiday visas.

The primary goal of the programme is to foster cultural immersion and strengthen international exchanges, turning travel into more than just a holiday—it becomes an opportunity for personal and cultural growth! A working holiday offers a valuable opportunity to explore new directions through experiencing life in another country.



By immersing yourself in new cultures, trying out different jobs and gaining hands-on experience, you'll not only get to know yourself better, but it will also help you find out what you want to do in the future. This journey will empower you to make more confident and informed decisions about your future.

WHY CONSIDER DOING A WORK & TRAVEL?

- **Expand your worldview:** You will experience a country, its customs and its people more than you ever could on a short holiday trip.
- **Step out of your comfort zone:** You will challenge yourself and the way you think, leading to personal growth and greater self-awareness.
- **Build your confidence:** You will navigate unfamiliar places and become more independent.
- **Improve your language skills:** You will interact with native speakers daily, helping you learn a language faster.
- **Hands-on career guidance:** Trying out different jobs and sectors will help you discover your passions and shape your career choices.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF A WORKING HOLIDAY VISA?

- **Extended stay:** Live, travel and work in a new environment for up to 12 months.
- **Complete flexibility:** You can enter and leave the country during the visa's validity (a special re-entry permit is required for Japan).
- **Cultural exploration:** Develop a deep cultural awareness and an openness to new ideas and perspectives!
- **Work opportunities:** Take on short-term employment during your stay (an 'open work permit' is required for Canada).
- **Gain experience:** Acquire new skills, whether practical, intellectual, social, cultural or artistic.

MUST-KNOW

- ! While this brochure gives a useful overview of the opportunities provided by a Work & Travel experience, we encourage you to do your own research on what a working holiday visa entails. We hope this brochure sparks your curiosity and inspires you to embark on this exciting adventure!

CONDITIONS

To apply for a working holiday visa in a partner country, you must:

- be between 18 and 30 years old (for Canada, Chile, South Korea and Taiwan, the age limit is extended to 35 years);
- hold a valid Luxembourgish passport;
- not be accompanied by dependents (e.g. children under your responsibility);
- have sufficient financial resources to support yourself at your destination and to buy a return ticket;
- have not already participated in this programme in the chosen destination (you can participate once per destination).

BEFORE YOUR DEPARTURE

START YOUR VISA APPLICATION

Start your visa application at least a few months in advance — the earlier, the better! We recommend beginning your research 6 months to 1 year prior to your planned departure. Find all the necessary information about the application process on the [MFA's website](#).

DECLARE YOUR STAY ABROAD

Luxembourg nationals are encouraged to declare their stay abroad, especially for long-term trips. This ensures that you receive the best possible consular assistance if needed. Consult with your doctor or a travel clinic several months before your departure to ensure you're up to date on necessary vaccinations. ORGANISE YOUR WORK & TRAVEL

Living in another country for an extended period comes with its own set of preparations. To ensure a smooth transition and experience, make sure to follow the following steps:

-  **Secure travel insurance:** Protect yourself with comprehensive travel insurance to ensure a safe and worry-free time abroad.
-  **Set up a local phone number:** Stay connected with a local phone number. Research options in advance to find the best plan.
-  **Open a local bank account:** Manage your finances by opening a bank account in the local currency. Consider online banks that operate locally.
-  **Research public transportation:** Learn about the local public transportation options. Getting a transport card or knowing the best ways to get around makes your daily commute easier.

LEARN THE LOCAL LANGUAGE

Before your adventure, familiarise yourself with the local language of your destination. Knowing at least the basics will make your experience more enriching, helping you navigate daily interactions and integrate into the community.

In Luxembourg, the Institut national des langues Luxembourg (INLL) offers language courses. Additionally, you can find various language learning resources on the lifelong-learning portal.

ASK YOURSELF SOME QUESTIONS

To get started with your Work & Travel planning, it's important to ask yourself some key questions. These will help you define your goals, preferences and needs, making your research more focused and effective.

QUESTIONS	IDEAS TO CONSIDER
Which country do I want to visit?	Start by choosing your destination. Consider factors such as the languages you speak or wish to learn, your budget, work opportunities, and the unique experiences each country offers.
When should I go?	A working holiday is ideal for transitional periods in your life, such as: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• after high school and before starting higher education (Bachelor, BTS, etc.);• between completing a Bachelor's and starting a Master's degree;• after finishing your studies and prior to entering the job market;• or simply whenever you feel ready for a new adventure!
What are my goals?	Define what you want to get out of your working holiday. Whether it's gaining work experience, diving into cultural exchange, travelling, or all of the above.
How do I want to structure my trip?	Decide how you'll balance work and travel. Will you work first and then travel, or combine both throughout your stay? Consider whether you want to settle in one place, explore multiple regions, or even visit neighbouring countries.

QUESTIONS	IDEAS TO CONSIDER
What type of accommodation suits me?	Think about where you'd like to stay—whether it's in a hostel, homestay, apartment or hotel. Your choice will affect your experience and budget, so choose what fits your style and comfort level the best.
What type of work interests me?	Identify the types of jobs you're interested in. Consider whether you want to work in a specific sector, develop certain skills or simply find a job that helps you fund your travels.
What cultural norms should I know?	Learn about the cultural norms and etiquette of your destination. Understanding these can help you adapt, avoid misunderstandings and show respect for the local culture.

- **Common Work & Travel opportunities:** Hospitality (bar, café, restaurant), tourism (guide, hotel, hostel, camping), agriculture (fruit picking, vineyard work, farm work) and seasonal work (surf school).

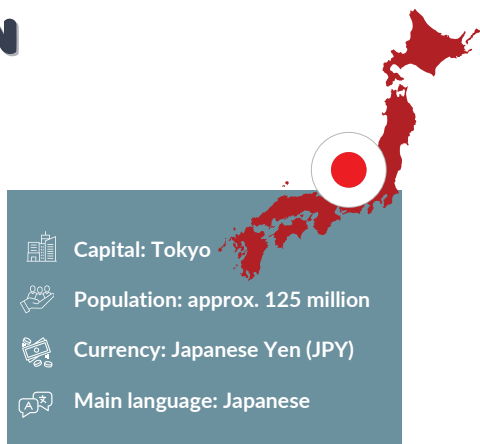

- **Local transportation:** Extensive and efficient public transit including trains, subways and buses throughout the country.
- **Common Work & Travel opportunities:** Tourism (guide, hotel, hostel) English teaching (language and conversation schools, private tutoring), seasonal work (ski resorts) and agriculture (farm work).

- **Local transportation:** Good public transport systems in cities. Car rentals are popular for exploring the countryside.
- **Common Work & Travel opportunities:** Hospitality (bar, café, restaurant), tourism (guide, hotel, hostel, camping), agriculture (farm work, fruit picking, vineyard work) and seasonal work (ski resorts, adventure tours).

- **Common Work & Travel opportunities:** English teaching (language and conversation schools, private tutoring), tourism (guide, hotel, hostel) and agriculture (farm work, fruit picking).

WORK OPPORTUNITIES

Gaining work experience before doing a working holiday can be very beneficial. Experience in different fields helps you adapt quickly to various roles, whether you're working in a café, teaching a language class, or assisting on a farm. For example, prior experience in a bar or restaurant can significantly improve your chances of securing similar work abroad, as many employers in the hospitality sector appreciate prior experience. Not only will this enhance your skills and strengthen your resume, but it can also help you save money for your upcoming adventure.

The following list provides an overview of common work fields and sectors that working holiday visa holders can explore. Additionally, we've included helpful tips on how to find opportunities in each of these areas.

TOURISM & HOSPITALITY

The tourism and hospitality sector offers a wide range of job opportunities, making it a popular choice for working holiday visa holders.

➤ Benefits: Working in tourism and hospitality helps you develop valuable skills such as customer service, communication and teamwork, which are beneficial for various career paths. Additionally, it allows you to engage with people from diverse backgrounds, enhancing your cultural awareness and adaptability.

➤ Options: Seasonal changes affect the types of jobs available. In winter, ski resorts often seek additional staff for roles both on and off the ski slopes. During the warmer seasons, beach bars, surf schools, hostels and seaside restaurants typically need extra help. Hotels and campgrounds also often require additional staff for housekeeping, front desk service or event coordination. Hostels frequently offer part-time work that may include accommodation. If you have specific skills or are willing to learn, you can even explore roles as a tour guide, adventure tour provider or at local visitor information centres.



TIPS & TRICKS

Flexibility is key in this sector. Adapt your job search to the local climate and tourism peaks. Networking with other travellers and locals, checking job boards and visiting businesses in person can increase your chances of finding the right opportunity.

AGRICULTURE

Working in the agricultural sector is particularly popular among working holiday visa holders. These jobs are often seasonal, providing an opportunity to work outdoors and experience rural life in your host country.

➤ **Benefits:** Agricultural work fosters a strong work ethic, physical stamina and a deeper appreciation for the farming industry. It also provides insight into various agricultural practices, which can be beneficial if you're contemplating a career in environmental or agricultural sectors.

➤ **Options:** Common agricultural jobs include fruit picking, vineyard harvesting and general farm work, such as planting and animal care. Some farms and vineyards offer accommodation and meals as part of the job package, making it a budget-friendly option for travellers. Opportunities can vary by season, so you might find different types of work available throughout the year.





TIPS & TRICKS

Connect with other travellers and locals, visit local farms in person and use hostels to find opportunities. Some regions have dedicated websites or job fairs for seasonal farm work, so keep an eye out for these resources.

LANGUAGE TEACHING

In countries where English is not the primary language, working holiday visa holders often have the opportunity to teach English. Additionally, fluency in other languages, such as French, Spanish or German, can lead to teaching roles, especially in multicultural cities.

 **Benefits:** Teaching provides valuable skills such as communication, leadership and cultural exchange. Helping others improve their language skills can be a highly rewarding experience. A teaching role also boosts your resume if you are considering a career in education or linguistics.

 **Options:** You can find work in language schools, conversational classes, local language cafés or through private tutoring. Obtaining a TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language) certification can significantly enhance your job prospects. Additionally, you may also discover opportunities to teach other languages that you are fluent in.



TIPS & TRICKS

Networking with other travellers, connecting with language schools and checking local job boards can help you discover opportunities. Online platforms and teaching agencies can also connect you with schools looking for language teachers.

AU PAIR OPPORTUNITIES

If you enjoy working with children or have babysitting experience, becoming an au pair can be a great way to experience life in a new country. This role involves living with a host family and taking care of their children, allowing you to immerse yourself in the local culture and language.



In Taiwan and Chile, au pair work requires a different type of visa. Ensure you check the specific rules for your destination.

➤ **Benefits:** Being an au pair provides hands-on experience in childcare and household management. It also offers the opportunity to build a strong relationship with a host family, thus enhancing your cultural understanding and language skills. This experience is particularly beneficial if you are considering a career in education, childcare or social services.

➤ **Options:** Typically, an au pair is responsible for childcare and everyday household tasks in exchange for accommodation, meals and a stipend. Various websites can help you find au pair placements abroad. Here are two popular options:

Placement agencies, including those in Luxembourg, can help you find a host family at your destination. These agencies match you with families based on your preferences and skills. We encourage you to conduct your own research on various platforms to explore your options and agencies.

OTHER WORK OPPORTUNITIES

While tourism, hospitality, agriculture, language teaching and au pairing are popular options for Work & Travel, they are just a few examples of many available. Depending on your background and experience, you may find additional opportunities that align with your skills and interests:

-  **Professional roles:** With a background in fields such as IT, marketing or finance, you might find professional job opportunities that match your expertise.
-  **Freelancing and remote work:** If you have skills in writing, graphic design, programming, digital marketing, freelancing or remote work can be a great way to earn income while travelling.



TIPS & TRICKS

Keep your resume and LinkedIn profile up to date and include a link to your LinkedIn profile on your resume for easy reference during your job search abroad. LinkedIn is a valuable resource for discovering job opportunities in your destination country, enabling you to connect with potential employers and explore job listings.

VOLUNTEERING OPPORTUNITIES

Volunteering during your working holiday is an excellent way to immerse yourself in local cultures, contribute to local communities, and gain unique experiences beyond typical tourism. Many volunteering opportunities provide accommodation and meals in exchange for your help, making it a budget-friendly and enriching option.

Various platforms connect travellers with hosts and organisations worldwide, providing a variety of volunteering experiences such as organic farming, teaching, homestays and community work. While many opportunities include accommodation and food in exchange for work, some platforms may also list paid positions. Typically, volunteering platforms require a yearly membership fee to access their host contacts. It's a good idea to review the offerings and feedback on these platforms before signing up.

WWOOF (WORLD WIDE OPPORTUNITIES ON ORGANIC FARMS)

WWOOF connects volunteers with organic farms around the world, providing an opportunity to learn about sustainable farming practices and work in more rural areas. Volunteers typically work 4-6 hours a day in exchange for food and accommodation. This platform is ideal for those interested in outdoor work and living with a host family or community. ACCOMMODATION OPPORTUNITIES

Whether you're looking for a short-term or long-term stay, there are various housing options available to fit different needs and budgets. Here are some options to help you navigate your accommodation options:

-  **Hostels:** Ideal for those starting their adventure, hostels offer budget-friendly accommodation, a social atmosphere and amenities, such as communal kitchens and organised activities. They are a great way to meet fellow travellers and get settled into a new location. Many hostels also offer the possibility of working in exchange for free or discounted accommodation. Websites like [Hostelworld.com](https://www.hostelworld.com) can help you find hostels all over the world.

- **Rentals:** For longer stays, various platforms can assist you in finding apartments, shared rooms or houses. Popular platforms include [HousingAnywhere.com](https://www.housinganywhere.com) and [Airbnb.com](https://www.airbnb.com), which also offer monthly rental options. We encourage you to research platforms and opportunities specific to your destination country.
- **Homestays:** Staying with a local family offers a rich cultural experience and often includes meals and other amenities. Websites like [Homestay.com](https://www.homestay.com) can help you find these opportunities.
- **Co-Living Spaces:** Designed for longer stays, co-living spaces offer a mix of private and shared living areas, while also including communal events and networking opportunities. We encourage you to do your own research on platforms and opportunities specific to your destination country.



TIPS & TRICKS

Book your first accommodation in your host country before you leave home! Hostels are perfect for making first connections, meeting fellow travellers and even discovering job or volunteering opportunities on hostel noticeboards or through new connections. Once you're all settled, you can plan the upcoming months!

MIX & MATCH

A working holiday is all about flexibility and exploring. You don't have to stick to a fixed plan or a single type of accommodation. For instance, you might start by staying in a hostel to meet fellow travellers, then transition to a homestay for a deeper cultural experience. From there, you can choose to move into a long-term rental or explore other living arrangements.

Mix up your work experience as well! You might start with a café job to earn some initial funds, then switch to volunteering through WWOOF for a rural adventure, before switching to language teaching. The key is to stay open-minded and flexible! This approach lets you combine travel, work and volunteering, creating a personalised adventure just for you.

You don't need to plan your entire working holiday from start to finish. Opportunities often emerge once you're there. A working holiday is not only about work and travel; it is also about exploration and personal growth.

- ☐ Explore alternative accommodation options, such as homestays and co-living spaces.

JOB OPPORTUNITIES

- ☐ Look into local job boards and specialised working holiday platforms in your destination country.

VOLUNTEERING

Research various volunteering platforms and their opportunities.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Ensure you have health insurance that covers you in your destination (e.g. travel insurance).

Check any required vaccinations or health precautions for your destination.

Familiarise yourself with emergency numbers and local safety guidelines.

ADMINISTRATIVE PREPARATION

Research banking options, including local accounts, online banks and credit cards.

Look into options for obtaining a local phone plan.

Learn about local transportation options and how to navigate them.

CULTURAL PREPARATION

If possible, learn at least the basics of the local language.

Research local customs and cultural norms.

Read blog posts and travel stories to gain insights from other travellers.
